





We have made every effort to reconcile the two jupiter charter bills presented to us and do not believe that possible stop. To all to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting:

Whereas, On the 3rd day of February, 1887, Mrs. Mary M. Cochran was appointed Postmaster at Jupiter, in the County of St. Lucie, State of Florida, and whereas she did, on the 23rd day of February, 1887, execute a Bond, and has taken the Oath of Office, as required by law:

Now know ye, That confiding in the integrity, ability and punctuality of the said Mrs. Mary M. Cochran, I do commission her a Postmaster, authorized to execute the duties of that Office at Jupiter aforesaid, according to the Laws of the United States and the Regulations of the Post Office Department: To hold the said Office of Postmaster, with all the powers, privileges, and emoluments to the same belonging, during the pleasure of the Postmaster General of the United States.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand, and caused the seal of the Post Office Department to be affixed, at Washington City, this eleventh day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, and of the Independence of the United States the one hundred and eleventh.




FIRST POSTMISTRESS OF JUPITER, 1887

INTERNAL IMPROVEMENT FUND, STATE OF FLORIDA.

Deed No. 12507

Know all Men by these Presents, that the Trustees of the Internal Improvement Fund of the State of Florida, do hereby certify that an act of the General Assembly of said State, entitled "An Act to Provide for and Encourage a Liberal System of Internal Improvements in this State," approved January 6, 1855, 7th and 8th sections, and in consideration of the sum of Twenty Dollars per acre, to them in hand paid by Charles K. Carlin of the county of Bradford, State of Florida, have granted, bargained and sold, and do by these presents grant, bargain, sell and convey unto the said Charles K. Carlin and his heirs and assigns forever, the following described Lands, to-wit:


One Lot number four in Town-ship twenty four in Range thirty seven East

containing fifty six 7/8 acres, and lying and being in the county of Bradford, in said State of Florida

To Have and To Hold unto the said Charles K. Carlin and his heirs and assigns forever.



Be it in solemn state presents shall come, directing:

WHEREAS, a Certificate of the Register of the Land Office at Gainesville, Florida, has been deposited in the General Land Office, whereby it appears that full payment has been made by the Town of Jupiter, Palm Beach County, Florida, according to the provisions of Section three of the Act of Congress of July 3, 1926 (44 Stat. 963), for the Blocks one and twenty-three in the Townsite of Jupiter, Florida, containing five acres and twenty-five hundredths of an acre, according to the Plat of said Townsite approved December 28, 1927:

NOW KNOW YE, That the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, in consideration of the premises, and in conformity with the said Act of Congress, HAS GIVEN AND GRANTED, and by these presents DOES GIVE AND GRANT, unto the said Town of Jupiter, Palm Beach County, Florida, the Tract above described; TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities, and appurtenances, of whatsoever nature, thereunto belonging, unto the said Town of Jupiter, Palm Beach County, Florida, forever to be maintained for the purposes provided in said Act.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I, Calvin Coolidge,

President of the United States of America, have caused these letters to be made Patent, and the Seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto affixed.

GIVEN under my hand, at the City of Washington, the TWENTY-eighth day of SEPTEMBER in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and TWENTY-eight and of the Independence of the United States the one hundred and FIFTY-third




My dear Mayor and Commissioners:

At your request I have made a rather careful search for a contract entered into by the Town of Jupiter and Mr. Calverts and wife on July 16, 1948, in reference to the Log Cabin on the Atlantic Ocean.

I have analyzed the contract the very best I have made a rather careful search for the law provisions of this contract and, in short, it is my opinion that it is not binding upon the Town of Jupiter.

This property does not belong to the Town of Jupiter outright but by virtue of a patent from the United States Government with the following limitations: "To be used for an aviation field, school and other public purposes, forever maintained for such purposes only".

Obviously, then, if this property is now being used for any purpose other than the above quoted purposes, the contract is not binding upon the Town for one reason, that is the Town has no authority to enter such contract.

This contract attempts to tie up this park for nine years. I am of the opinion that, unless there was some special reason, this extended period is illegal. The Town can in all probability lease this property for temporary periods and for other proper purposes.

This lease attempts to appoint a superintendent or keeper to have possession and control of the property. The Town cannot appoint an employee for a period of time extending longer than the term of office of the authorities making the contract.

The consideration for this contract is unreasonably low in my opinion. For this valuable property the Town is only getting \$185.00 a year. I do not believe that type of a contract will be countenanced by the Court.

I am informed that a bar and liquor house is being operated on the property for the private use and profit of the lessee.

I am told that this lease has been assigned to other parties at one time or another. I am of the opinion that you have a right to select your own superintendent or park keeper and that it cannot be delegated by you to a lessee or anyone else.

The Log Cabin
Jupiter, Florida
April 9, 1953

To the Residents of Jupiter:

You will be asked to vote April 13th on whether you want your Commission to start court action to attempt to cancel the lease the town sold us on a part of the Log Cabin property. Eight years ago we made a contract with the town in good faith. We gambled on its future when no one else saw fit to do anything with this property in its run down condition. We used our own money to repair it and paid cash for the contract, and Jupiter paid off its total indebtedness with the money. Since then, under the concession clauses of the lease we now hold with the town, we have built up a business which we expect to increase in profits throughout the term of the contract. Should this lease be cancelled we expect an equitable settlement including part of the original purchase price plus anticipated profits for the balance of the contract.

It was the opinion of one of your former Town Commissioners and its attorney that the lease is valid. We so believe. Your present Commission feels that the town should receive more benefits from it. We have always taken the position that we are willing to discuss any change in the lease to give the town more benefits. Although the Commission has not come forward with any suggested changes, individual commissioners have made suggestions to us which would give the town substantial revenue and not disturb the federal grant for a public park. **THESE SUGGESTIONS WE WOULD BE GLAD TO ACCEPT.**

It would cost Jupiter an additional \$1,000.00 to \$2,000.00 to go into court, and if the lease were cancelled how would the town get any revenue to maintain its park except by a lease on the same terms? Don't be fooled by his "offers" for the whole park by Miami interests. Don't let anyone sell you short by removing the public park clause in your grant which such offers demand.

We sincerely invite you to come over to the Log Cabin this weekend and talk things over first hand. We offer to sit down with the new Commission you are now voting in and work out a solution. If you agree with us that this is the sensible way to avoid long expensive court action we ask you to vote against litigation. Vote "No" in the referendum April 13th.
