Town Council & CRA Corner: Recent Policy Actions

Below is a summary of some of the approvals and decisions made by the Town Council during recent meetings. To see items coming up on agendas for future meetings, visit www.jupiter.fl.us/Agendas. To watch meetings live, or to watch recorded meetings on-demand, visit www.jupiter.fl.us/LIVE

- **Community Center Improvements:** Approved a work order for \$93,942 with Wantman Group, Inc. for design work on mechanical, electrical and plumbing improvements at the Jupiter Community Center at 200 Military Trail.
- **Design Work Order for Jupiter Community Park Improvements:** Approved a work order for \$206,065 with Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. for design of athletic field drainage, building, sidewalk and ADA improvements at Jupiter Community Park.
- **Improvements to North and South Parking Lot Pods along Jupiter Beach:** Approved a contract for \$279,000 with E&F Florida Enterprises, Inc. to improve the north and south parking lot pods along Jupiter Beach.
- **Design Work Order for Arterial Roadway Landscaping:** Approved a work order for \$94,425 with Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. for design and post design of roadway landscaping along the North Pod/South Pod beach parking areas, County Road A1A, Riverwalk parking lot on Coastal Way, Riverwalk adjacent to the Lagoon Bridge, US Highway 1, Indiantown Road, Cypress Drive, Island Way, Central Boulevard, Military Trail, Alternate A1A, Toney Penna Drive, Frederick Small Road and Heights Boulevard.
- **Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Annual Action Plan:** Approved the 2020-2021 CDBG annual action plan for \$304,080.
- **Irrigation-quality Water Rates:** Increased the rate for irrigation-quality water sold to the Loxahatchee River District to \$0.2886 per 1,000 gallons based on Consumer Price Indexing.
- **Cybersecurity Contract:** Approved a contract for \$84,410 with Flagler Technologies for cybersecurity managed detection and response services.
- **Strategic Plan:** Adopted the Strategic Plan for fiscal year 2022. See the full plan online at www.jupiter.fl.us/StrategicPlan.
- **Police Vehicle Purchase:** Purchased ten police vehicles at the total price of \$434,178. The purchase was funded through the Community Investment Program (CIP).
- **Generation Church:** Amended the site plan to change the trim color on the existing church and maintain the S-tile metal roof on the historic chapel at 412, 418, 430 and 510 Center Street.
- **Jupiter Medical Center:** Amended a site plan to expand the surgical center, emergency department and central energy plant at Jupiter Medical Center at 1210 Old Dixie Highway.
- **Accessory Uses Buildings and Structures:** Amended the zoning code to allow accessory structures in the front yard of residential properties meeting certain area and dimension requirements.

2021-2022 Strategic Plan and Fiscal Year 2022 Budget Process

On March 2, the Town Council adopted its strategic plan for Fiscal Year 2021 - 2022. During a series of public workshops and meetings in January and February, Council reviewed progress on the previous

year's plan, and discussed and prioritized proposals for new items to include, considering resident feedback, current economic and environmental conditions, and other inputs.

The Strategic Plan contains the Town's vision and mission, and identifies nine strategic results that identify outcomes the Town aspires to achieve. These strategic results guide the creation of strategic initiatives each year that identify the projects and efforts the Town Council would like to see completed. The adopted 2021-2022 Strategic Plan includes 25 strategic initiatives for Town Staff to focus on in the coming year. The strategic initiatives fall into one of the nine strategic results categories shown in the wheel to the right. In some years, like this one, not all nine strategic results have strategic initiatives assigned.

In order to implement the strategic initiatives, they must be incorporated into the work plan for Town Staff and the budget, or financial plan, for the Town. During the summer, the Town Council will hold a series of public workshops and meetings to discuss the Town's proposed budget for fiscal year 2022, which begins on October 1, 2021. Day-to-day operations and personnel expenses will be incorporated into the proposed budget, along with funding necessary to work on completing the adopted strategic initiatives. This ensures that the resources of the Town are focused on the areas that are most important to the Town Council and represent the feedback received from residents and businesses that went into the development of the strategic plan.

Workshops for the annual operating budget and 5-year Community Investment Program (CIP) will begin in June and lead up to the review and approval of the millage rate (property tax rate), budget and CIP in two public hearings in September. The budget and 5-year CIP cover the upcoming fiscal year, which begins on October 1 and ends September 30.

Hurricane Season Begins June 1: Be Prepared

As hurricane season approaches, Floridians know that being prepared is the best strategy. Whether predictions for the upcoming season are active or not, having a plan for your family, your property, and your business is important.

Similarly, the Town hopes for the best and prepares for the worst in its storm and severe weather preparations. In the event of a storm, the Town's Emergency Operations Center (EOC), located in the new Police Headquarters and Data Center building, becomes the hub for essential personnel. The

Town's new EOC is able to withstand hurricane-force winds up to 192 mph, and provides a safe, centrally- located place for Town personnel. Members of law enforcement, Town management, communications and Information Systems (IS) gather at the EOC to manage activities before, during and after the storm. The Town's Chief of Police acts as Incident Commander during any emergency, coordinating operations among groups of essential personnel to ensure the safety of the community. With preparation in mind, create your family's or business' plan before the June 1 start of hurricane season. Consider whether or not you will leave the area if a storm threatens, where your nearest shelter is located, create a supply list, and make preparations for pets, boats, homes, and other property. One frequently asked question from residents and businesses is how to trim trees and foliage in preparation for storm season. On page 4 of this edition, there is a helpful "Ask the Expert" article on tree trimming do's and don'ts.

Every family and business has different things to consider when creating their storm plan. Three ADA-Accessible Beach Walkovers Open Along Jupiter Beach

In March, the Town opened three accessible beach crossovers at markers 31, 45 and 48. These new crossovers meet the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requirements for accessibility, and feature long, gradual ramps instead of stairs, access aisles of at least 5 feet, handrails, and landings. Jupiter’s Award-Winning Water Remains Among the Lowest-Cost in the Region

Did you know that Jupiter Utilities uses some of the most advanced water treatment technologies to process up to 30 million gallons of water per day? Even though Jupiter Utilities uses some of the most advanced water treatment technologies, its rates are 24.1% lower than the average paid in the region spanning from St. Lucie County to Palm Beach County. Of the utilities using reverse osmosis treatment, Jupiter’s rates are the lowest, over 30.6% below the average of what others charge.

A typical customer in Jupiter uses about 10,000 gallons per month. The table below illustrates typical residential water utility charges for a standard service.

Councilor's House Receives Historic Designation

In September, 2020 Town Council approved a local historic designation and historic preservation grant for the privately-owned Councilor's House, located at 305 2nd Street. The single-family house was built in 1945 and is located in the Pines Garden South neighborhood that was platted in 1925. The home's architectural style and wood frame vernacular is indicative of the post-World War II time period. The house was named The Councilor's House because three different Jupiter Town Councilors owned the home over the years - William Edward Haymond, Neil DuBois and Kenneth Meyer.

To restore the historic home, the owner received a total of \$44,186 from the historic preservation grant. With this grant money, the owner will replace siding, soffit and fascia; paint; restore the front porch; and repair the foundation of the house.

Fraud Prevention Tip: Beware of Virus Scams

"Virus found." "Your computer is infected." "Your account has been compromised." The message may come in the form of a phone call, an e-mail, or a pop up on your computer. Whatever form it takes, someone is trying to coerce you into making reckless and impulsive choices out of fear. They may ask for a gift card payment, a credit card payment or even worse, for you to allow them remote access to your computer to fix the problem. They may claim that they are with a reputable company, or even a

company you are familiar with. Whatever request is made of you, do not agree. So what should you do? If you are truly concerned that you might have a problem with your computer, take your device(s) to a reputable technician for a scan. Don't click on anything, open any links, or download any documents or programs. Don't ever provide personal information or bank account information to anyone you do not know or trust. Remember, the person calling or emailing you has a goal of creating a sense of urgency and fear in you to get you to act before thinking. By taking your time and being cautious, you can avoid being scammed.

Town Names New Chief of Police

On February 8, Jupiter's new Chief of Police David E. England was sworn-in by Judge Ted Booras in a small, socially-distanced promotion ceremony. Chief England succeeded Chief Daniel Kerr, who retired on February 5, after over 50 years in law enforcement.

Chief England was born and raised in northern Palm Beach County and began his career in law enforcement with the Largo Police Department in 1994. Since joining the Jupiter Police Department in 1998, he has served as a Field Training Officer, Firearms Instructor, Training Coordinator, SWAT Team Member and SWAT Team Commander, and has commanded the Administrative Services, Patrol Operations and Criminal Investigations Bureaus. In 2018 he was named Deputy Chief of the Jupiter Police Department, supporting Chief Kerr in the leadership of the department. He holds a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice from Florida State University and a Master's Degree in Public Administration from Nova Southeastern University. In September of 2011, then Major England graduated from the 246th Session of the FBI National Academy in Quantico, Virginia. Chief England is married to his wife Karen and they have two teenage sons.

Chief England's wide range of experience and his history with the Jupiter Police Department and the community of Jupiter made him an ideal candidate for the position of Chief of Police. The Jupiter Town Council, Town Manager Matt Benoit and the staff of the Town of Jupiter and Jupiter Police Department were all excited to see Chief England assume his new duties, and wish him much success in his new position.

Jupiter Beach A1A Pedestrian and Bicycle Safety Initiative

In January, the Jupiter Police Department Beach Unit started a safety initiative to help protect the pedestrians and bicyclists that walk and bike along the beach corridor. The initiative was created after officers observed numerous pedestrian and bicyclist safety concerns along A1A.

Some of the concerns include pedestrians (walkers, joggers and rollerbladers) using the bike lane instead of the sidewalk, bicyclists failing to obey traffic control devices, and multiple bicyclists riding side by side causing a hazard for other bikers, pedestrians and motorists.

The goal of the initiative is to build greater awareness of the safe and proper use of the bike lanes and sidewalks so that everyone can enjoy the beautiful beach corridor, as well as to prevent accidents and related injuries.

A few reminders for bicyclists and pedestrians as they enjoy the beach corridor along A1A:

- Bicyclists should travel within the proper bicycle lanes, not impeding vehicular traffic behind them, and

obeying traffic control devices.

- Pedestrians (including rollerbladers) should use sidewalks where provided, and should not travel upon the portion of a roadway paved for vehicular traffic, except while crossing a street within a crosswalk.

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)

Action Plan for 2020-2021

Each year, the Town's Neighborhood Services group develops an annual action plan for the allocation of funding provided through the CDBG program, administered by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). At its February 16, meeting, the Town Council approved the 2020-2021 Annual Action Plan, which would result in \$304,080 in funding to assist low-to-moderate income neighborhoods and residents in the Town.

The 2020-2021 Action Plan includes a recommendation to fund stormwater and drainage improvements in the Pine Gardens North neighborhood for \$243,264. The remaining dollars in the grant will be used for administration costs.

For the preparation of the Plan, the Town hosted two public meetings to discuss the CDBG Program and solicit ideas from the public. The meetings were held at the Jupiter Community Center on January 30, 2020 at 11 am and 6 pm. Residents were given a brief presentation about the overall CDBG Program. After the summary, meeting attendees were given an opportunity to identify housing and community development priorities for the Town, comment on past performance and provide input on fair housing in Jupiter.

In addition, Neighborhood Services communicated with other Town departments and area non-profits to discuss the CDBG process and solicit projects. Neighborhood Services annually hosts several neighborhood topics meetings where CDBG is discussed. The meetings consist of attendees from the Town of Jupiter Neighborhood Services, Building, Code Compliance, Engineering, Parks and Public

Works, Planning and Zoning, Police and Recreation Departments.

Protect our Natural Water Resources by Avoiding Fertilizer Use During the Rainy Season

Many commercially-available fertilizers contain nutrients like nitrogen and phosphorus that can become harmful runoff affecting the water quality in our creeks and rivers. To combat this issue, the Jupiter Town Council passed an ordinance in October, 2018 prohibiting the use of these fertilizers during the rainy season, which runs from June 1 through September 30. Residents, landscapers and lawn care businesses are urged to avoid the use of these fertilizers when caring for plant life and lawns. Farms, golf courses and specialized turf areas (such as athletic fields) are exempt from the restrictions, but are encouraged to be careful about fertilizer application during the rainy season.

Many common fertilizers available at home improvement and lawn care stores most likely contain the harmful ingredients and are subject to the ban. There are alternative fertilizers that do not contain the chemicals that cause harmful runoff, and a list of acceptable fertilizers can be found at www.befloridiannow.org. Ask the Expert: Tree Pruning as Hurricane Season Approaches

With Hurricane season approaching, now is the time to make sure that your landscape is prepared. Making sure that your trees and shrubs are properly pruned can decrease wind damage and prevent additional debris during a storm. We spoke with Gretchen Carr and Barrett Cruce from the Town's Natural Resources Division of the Planning & Zoning Department to learn the best pruning tips for before hurricane season.

Q: Why is it important to make sure your landscaping is properly maintained prior to hurricane season?

A: Properly pruned trees and palms are more resistant to strong winds. A sturdy, well-spaced framework of healthy branches growing from a single trunk makes for a strong tree. In the same way, a palm with a head full of fronds is more protected than one that has been significantly trimmed.

Q: If a storm is coming, should I still prune and leave the cuttings out for pickup?

A: The best time to prune is early in the year, before hurricane season. Do not prune or trim shrubs when a storm is approaching since there may not be time for the debris to be picked up and yard waste can become projectiles in a storm.

Q: Are there landscape companies that prune trees in preparation for the hurricane season?

A: Yes, but be aware that though certain tree and palm trimming services are offered at this time of year, often called hurricane trimming, the techniques that are often employed may be a violation of Town Code and can, in fact, cause more harm to the tree. Q: Is regular pruning good for trees?

A: Pruning tree limbs regularly will improve the tree's structure, encourage proper growth and enhance the tree's appearance. Proper pruning is especially important for younger trees. The older the tree, the less frequently pruning is necessary. Pruning is best done from winter to early spring time.

Q: Are there wrong ways to prune a tree?

A: Pruning a tree the right way can make it stronger, healthier and improve clearance and visibility. However, pruning a tree the wrong way can cause major problems. Topping, or hat-racking, is a type of pruning where much of the canopy is removed from a tree, leaving mostly branch stubs. Topping causes the tree to put out clusters of thin, poorly-attached weak branches and can initiate decay in branches by preventing them from healing. Topping is equivalent to butchering a tree. Another pruning error is excessive lifting, or lion's tailing, named as such due to the removal of most small branches along a main branch, leaving only a tuft of leaves at the very end. Lifting trees is a common pruning practice where the lower branches of the tree are removed to provide clearance for cars, structures, etc. However, over-lifting, or excessive thinning of trees, is a poor pruning practice. This type of pruning causes trees to be top heavy, reduces trunk taper and increases chances of branch breakage in storms. Both of these practices disfigure the natural form of the tree, create potential hazards and are violations of the Town's Code.

Q: How should a tree service or arborist be chosen?

A: Homeowners who rush to accept the service of a tree expert are frequently taken advantage of by fly-by-night amateurs with a pickup truck and chainsaw. The result of this is poor quality work is an ugly, potentially hazardous tree and greater long term costs. The best option is to choose a tree care professional. Only hire a certified arborist (tree care professional) to prune your trees. The individual should be listed on the International Society of Arboriculture (ISA) website www.treesaregood.org/findanarborist. The individual should also have an occupational license with the Town and should be fully insured for property damage, personal liability and worker compensation.
